The appropriate emergency eye irrigation solution at the time and place of chemical eye injury, usually before transfer to a healthcare facility, is tap water which of course does not require TGA classification. Should proprietary eye irrigation solutions be necessary at other times and places for chemical injury and any other indication, RANZCO believes they should remain as "Class I sterile" since they are not intended for absorption into the body, the particular feature that would require reclassification.
